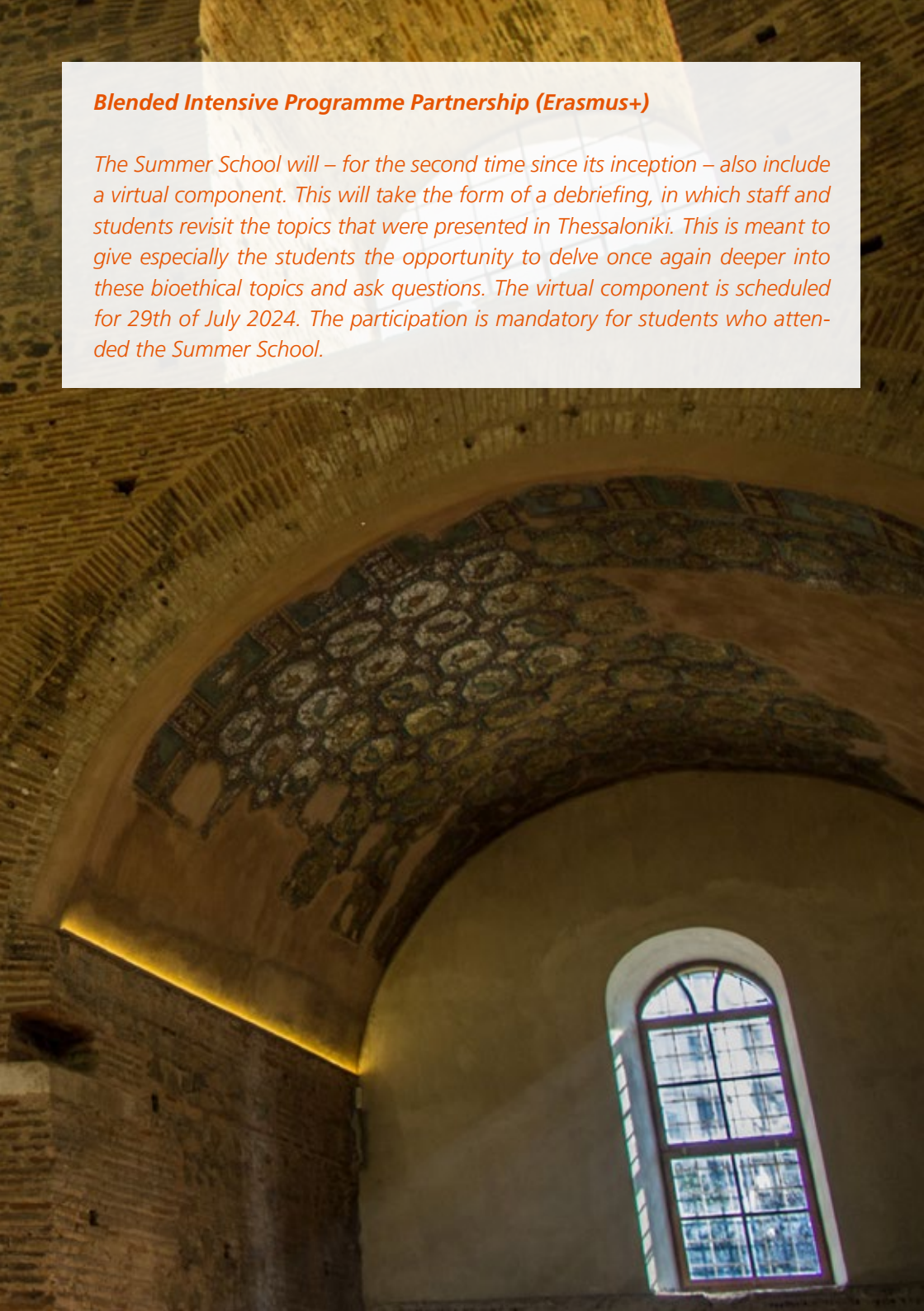
Bioethics in Context XI – Sources of Integrative Bioethics in the History of Philosophy

Bioethics in general has firmly established itself as an academic discipline over the course of the 20th century. The more specific concept of Integrative Bioethics – in direct comparison – is a much younger field of study. Yet already it can look back at a history that, as of 2024, spans two decades. This year's summer school will broaden its scope by trying to seek out and recover bioethical resources in the annals of the history of philosophy. Thus, well-known as well as lesser-known thinkers of the last two millennia will be sought out to see if those in part forgotten perspectives can enhance today's philosophical discourse, be it in regards to reflections about the relationship of life and the living or man and non-human nature etc. To that end, the programme will range from thinkers of the Greek pre-Socratics to Thomas Aquinas and representatives of classical German philosophy through to Whitehead.



Blended Intensive Programme Partnership (Erasmus+)

The Summer School will – for the second time since its inception – also include a virtual component. This will take the form of a debriefing, in which staff and students revisit the topics that were presented in Thessaloniki. This is meant to give especially the students the opportunity to delve once again deeper into these bioethical topics and ask questions. The virtual component is scheduled for 29th of July 2024. The participation is mandatory for students who attended the Summer School.

How to reach the Hotel Queen Olga from SKG Airport:

Bus Route 01X directly connects the airport to Thessaloniki city center. It is the only operating direct bus route between the airport and the city.

- The nearest stop to the Hotel is called „Scholi Tiflon“ (School for the blind) on Leoforos (Avenue) Vasilissis Olgas nr. 32.
- From there, it takes a few minutes on foot to reach the Queen Olga Hotel on Leoforos (Avenue) Vasilissis Olgas nr. 44

How to reach the Faculty of Theology from Hotel Queen Olga:

To reach the Faculty of Theology from the Hotel:

- either by taxi (approx.. 15 minutes)
- or bus route 3K (Α.Σ. ΙΚΕΑ - Ν.Σ. ΣΤΑΘΜΟΣ) from the same bus stop „Scholi Tiflon“ to bus stop Κέντρο Ιστορίας Θεσσαλονίκης (Kentro Istorias Thessalonikis) or Διαγώνιος (Diagonios).
From there on foot to Aristotle University, Faculty of Theology.

Excursion to Vergina (background information)

The archaeological site of Vergina (or Aigai) is a monument of global cultural heritage and a place of great natural beauty. A grass covered burial mound has been converted into a museum where visitors can descend to unspoiled royal Macedonian tombs from the time of Alexander the Great and his king father Philip II. Nearby, the recently restored 2.300-year-old Palace of Aigai also awaits to be visited. The palace and its neighboring tombs have been recognized as a UNESCO World Heritage site.
